She may have starred in Lost In Translation, but when it comes to her style, Scarlett is far from lost-she's found the perfect way to accent her beauty with gorgeous hairdos. For this look, start with clean hair. Work a generous amount of Rawhold Gel through the hair and dry with a round brush to flatten the hair. Roll the entire head in medium hot rollers in a traditional brick pattern. Follow with a light mist of Rawhold Hairspray and allow the rollers to cool completely. Take the rollers out gently and use your hands to grab all the hair from the ears up and pull back to just below the crown; turn and twist the hair as if it was a small ponytail in either direction and secure with a few hidden bobby pins. If the crown seems flat push the ponytail up and watch the height in the crown lift! If it's too high, drag the ponytail down. Pull out the small front piece, back-comb slightly for height, place on either side and secure with a few hair pins or hidden bobby pins. Next, I blowdried the fringe with a large round bush to give it a little lift and direction. For the rest of the hair here, I used the round brush again, but not too much or the hair can get too smooth.

Follow with a mist of Rawhold Gel sprayed up into the hair while tipping the head from side to side. To finish, a little Dream Cream on the ends for texture, a mist of Love That Shine Spray and you're done!


## **Oprah Winfrey**

## Ask the Hair Doctor



I have naturally blonde hair, although it has faded a lot this past year. My mom won't let me bleach my hair, but she will let me use semi-permanent dyes. I have been using the same dye for a while now. It normally works really well; the color looks perfect and lasts for about two months. Recently I dyed my hair with my regular dye, but this time it didn't really work as well. My hair seemed to be slightly darker than usual and there is also a slight green tint to the color. What can I do?—Anna

There are a number of reasons for hair to develop an odd green tint ranging from sun, pool chemicals, bad water supply, well water, chemical contamination AND hair color mishaps. Green tints to blonde hair after applying fresh hair color could possibly be due to the fact that the color has a blue base and your natural blonde hair has a yellow or gold hue. It is possible that this green tint occurred before but was not as noticeable. Or it could be possible that other factors were present such as higher levels of copper in your water supply.

I always recommend contacting the manufacturers of the hair color product as the first option. Most of the big companies have toll free phone numbers listed on the box or on the inside instruction page, and it is their job to help customers with problems that may occur as a result of using their hair color as well as give suggestions on how to correct it. The hair color operator will probably ask for the exact shade or number of the product, so either have the hair color box available or make a note of all pertinent information before you call.

If you do want to try and fix this at home, which I usually don't recommend, a common trick is to apply a red-based toner that is available from most professional beauty supply stores. A color shampoo designed for red hair just might have enough of the red you need to balance out the green. There are several you can try including Rene Furterer, Paul Mitchell and ARTec.

Another solution is to give yourself a deep conditioning treatment, leaving the product of your choice on your hair for at least 30 minutes. To do a deep conditioning I would suggest that you first shampoo hair in warm water, rinse well and then slather on a good deep conditioning product, making sure to avoid the

towel to help the conditioner penetrate deeper into the cuticles. This will often help balance the color throughout the follicles and minimize any odd shades. It doesn't always work, but it is something you can try.

Hot olive oil conditioning treatments might also help. Olive oil is acidic and known to help tone down dark hair color naturally. If you are used to doing olive oil treatments or have medium to coarsely textured hair, you could try a hot olive oil wrap. If your hair is thin, do not try this as the oil can be too heavy for your hair type.

Even if you fix the green right now with the red toner or hot oil trick, what happens when you want to color your hair again? You may wish to ask the hair color folks if you should change to a different formula to prevent this problem in the future.

If all else fails in your attempts to neutralize the green, check for a professional colorist where you live that does color correction work. It is expensive but can get you back on a good hair color track much faster than if you try to do it yourself.

I am a woman over 40 with very wavy shoulder length hair. I can't find anyone to cut my hair the way I would like. I don't want it to be too short but I want it to be easy to care for, and look age appropriate. Any suggestions for a trendy style to suit my needs?—Bonnie

As I am sure you can understand, if you are having a difficult time finding someone to cut your hair into a style you like in person, it would be virtually impossible to suggest a hairstyle for you without ever setting eyes on you. There are too many variables that would have to be considered such as your face shape, hair texture and your personal style preferences. Consider the following options:



- Go to a bookstore that has hair, beauty and fashion magazines with photos
  of women that you can relate to, like
   ShortCuts! Flip through the magazines
  and find images of styles you like.
- Make a list of celebrities with hair similar to yours, with similar ages and lifestyles. Marg Helgenberger from CSI is in her forties and often wears her hair in carefully layered bobs to bring out her natural waves so she can scrunch and go. Oprah also is known to wear her curly/wavy hair in a variety of gorgeous trendy styles. Sheryl Crow, Sela Ward and Meg Ryan are also fine examples.
- Start collecting your own file of styles that you could see yourself wearing.
   Most hairdressers are very visual and work better when they have hairstyles to look at and discuss with you.
- Watch for women your age wearing trendy hairstyles you admire. Ask them who cuts their hair. Many people are very flattered when their hair is noticed and complimented—and are usually very willing to provide a reference to their hairdresser.
- Gather those recommendations and then make appointments for a style consultation only, which are usually free. Show the stylist the images you have collected and the celebrities you admire for their hair. Make it clear that you want to think about your options before you submit to a new cut, there will be no pressure for you to let the hairdresser cut your hair on the spot.
- Check out prominent women in the public eye in your location that are similar to your age and wear trendy hairstyles. If they are TV newscasters, their hair will need to be attractive and trendy. Call the TV station and ask if you could find out who does their hair.



My hair was straightened using the Yuko system and looks extremely brittle with split ends. I have been deep conditioning and nursing it for three weeks now. Is there one specific product that will really make a difference, especially in appearance?—Helaine

There are many products designed specifically to help hair with your described condition, unfortunately not all products work for all types of hair. Some work better for some people than others.

I would suggest that you first have the ends trimmed to remove the worst split ends. It doesn't have to be a lot, maybe just 1/2-inch.

There are products specifically designed for Yuko to help condition, and it is my understanding that they can be purchase directly from Yuko. However, if you wish to use separate non-Yuko products, the following have been formulated to help hair that is brittle from chemical processing:

- Phytonectar shampoo. This shampoo product was developed specifically for hair that is thermally reconditioned. I recommend that people dilute one part shampoo to three parts water in a clean plastic bottle. The liquid should be gently drizzled from the roots down to the ends, and I recommend that the middle to end sections receive just the bare minimum of shampoo suds to help remove dirt.
- Other gentle Phyto shampooing products include Phytojoba, Phytorhum, Phytocitrus and Phytospecific Intense Nutrition Shampoo. Again, I always recommend that they be heavily diluted for hair in delicate condition.
- Rene Furterer Karite Shampoo, Rene Furterer Astera Soothing Milk Shampoo or Okara Repairing Shampoo are all designed to help hair that has been chemically treated with TR or Yuko.
- Aveda Shampure and ARTec Smoothing Shampoo. The less often you shampoo, the more time your hair has to build up natural oils that give hair a chance to strengthen and recover. If you can shampoo every other day or even two times a week with diluted product, that would be really good for your strands.



- Conditioners designed to help with damage include Rene Furterer Karite Nourishing Conditioning Cream, Phytokarite Deep Conditioning Cream, Phytospecific Intense Nutrition Mask, Aveda Curessence Conditioner or ARTec Kiwi Conditioner.
- Good leave-in conditioners include Phyto 9 which is heavier than Phyto 7 and Aveda Styling Curressence.
- Always shampoo in lukewarm, never hot water and do a cool/cold rinse. When possible let hair air-dry to avoid the use of hot styling tools of any kind. If you must use a blow dryer, use one on the coolest, slowest setting possible to avoid additional stress for application of heat.
- Drink at least eight glasses of water every day. This helps to moisturize your follicles from the inside out.
- Be sure to take vitamins that include Vitamin B to help rebuild your hair from the inside out as well.
- Sleep on a satin/silk pillow case to help safeguard against split ends.
- Whenever possible only use a pure boar's head brush on your strands and avoid combs that are not soft and snag free. If possible, use your fingers.
- Eat more protein which also helps strengthen follicles.
- Avoid any other chemical treatments for at least six months, preferably one year.
